A health system, also known as a health care system or healthcare system, is an association of workers, institutions, and resources that provide health care services to target populations. As a result, all indi-viduals and families in a community can access universal health care. And here PHC initiatives allow for full commu-nity participation in implementation and decision making. In the spirit of self-reliance and selfdetermination, ser-

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vices are provided at a cost that the community and the country can afford at each stage of development. In other words, PHC is a health-care approach that goes beyond the traditional health-care system and focuses on health-equity-producing social policy. PHC encompasses all aspects of health, such as access to health care, the environment, and lifestyle. As a result, primary healthcare and public health measures may be regarded as the cornerstones of universal health systems. The Health system planning is distributed among market participants in some countries. And the Governments, trade unions, charities, religious organisations, or other coordinated bodies make a concerted effort to deliver planned health care services to the populations they serve.

Health care planning, on the other hand, has been described as evolutionary rather than revolutionary. Health systems, like other social institutional structures, are likely to reflect the history, culture, and economics of the states in which they evolve. These peculiarities perplex and complicate international comparisons, preventing any universal standard of performance from being established.

Finally, the health system includes all organisations, people, and activities whose primary goal is to promote, restore, or maintain health. This includes both efforts to influence health determinants and more direct health-improving activities. As a result, a health system is more than a pyramid of publicly owned facilities that provide personal health services. A mother caring for a sick child at home, for example; private providers; behaviour change programmes; vector-control campaigns; health insurance organisations; and occupational health and safety legislation are all examples. It includes inter-sectoral action by health professionals, such as encouraging the ministry of education to promote female education, which is a well-known determinant of better health.

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
